

Pact Innovation Forum: Elevating SOTF Follow-through Research, Monitoring & Implementation

Executive Summary

Building on momentum from the Summit of the Future Follow-through Retreat (25-26 November 2024) at the Rockefeller Brothers Fund's Pocantico Center, the Pact Innovation Forum brings together governments, policy research, civil society, private sector groups, and global and regional international organizations *to realize the full potential of the Pact for the Future, Declaration on Future Generations, and Global Digital Compact's actions and commitments*. This informal, multistakeholder platform seeks to *innovate global governance* — engendering institutional, legal, policy, operational, and normative change across the multilateral system. Its core service areas for Summit of the Future follow-through research and innovation are: i) **policy research** (major reports, policy briefs, and commentaries); ii) **track 1.5 global and regional policy dialogues**; iii) **monitoring of progress**, including a **Pact Monitoring Toolkit**; and iv) a **community of practitioners, researchers, and advocates**, guided by a **Pact Innovation Plan**.

Flagship Initiative #1 A Pact Monitoring Toolkit: Rather than launching an entirely new monitoring mechanism, this set of tools pulls together existing indicators and other monitoring methodologies (e.g., for the Sustainable Development Goals) across the United Nations and broader multilateral system, as well as in research, private sector and civil society institutions worldwide. By identifying critical modeling and data gaps through a comprehensive mapping exercise, the Pact Monitoring Toolkit pulls together existing, as well as proposed new indicators to complement official efforts to gauge progress on the road to the September 2028 Pact for the Future high-level review — including a tailor-made logframe tracking tool and steps toward a searchable, online interactive portal (*please see accompanying Pact Monitoring Toolkit concept for further details*).

Flagship Initiative #2: A Pact Innovation Plan: With a focus on innovation and preserving the integrity of the Pact for the Future as a whole, this dynamic, research-driven, and catalytic instrument — developed through wide, multistakeholder consultations and Pact Monitoring Toolkit insights and analysis — provides Member States, the UN Secretariat and agencies, and civil society (including ImPact Coalitions) practical guidance, visualizations, and evidence-based options to facilitate Pact implementation and follow-through (*please see accompanying Pact Innovation Plan concept for further details*).

- i) Year 2 development of the **Pact Monitoring Toolkit**, including a new interactive online portal (Jan-Dec).

- v) **Track 1.5 Global Policy Dialogue** on “Defending Multilateralism through the Pact for the Future,” held during the 39th ACUNS Annual Meeting in Lisbon (1-3 July); further **Pact Innovation Plan** development.
- vi) **Pact Innovation Plan (Ver. 2)** and **Pact Monitoring Toolkit presented and discussed during a high-level UNGA 2026 side event** (and proposed Ministerial Dialogue on Pact Review Framework), feeding concrete ideas on implementation, monitoring, and follow-through in the run-up to the official SOTF official review, to be held at the start of the General Assembly's eighty-third session (20-26 Sept.).
- vii) Convene proposed (third) annual **Pact Innovation Forum Pocantico Retreat** (23-24 Nov.).

Full (Updated in October 2025) Concept Note on the Pact Innovation Forum

I. Backdrop to the Pact Innovation Forum

The Summit of the Future (22-23 September 2024 in New York) presented a generational moment to rebuild trust and address gaps in global governance; reaffirm the UN Charter, 2030 Agenda, and other existing commitments; and renew the multilateral system to prepare for over-the-horizon challenges and opportunities. In lending support for 56 Actions and 361 associated commitments (or “Sub-Actions”) adopted in the summit’s chief outcome documents — the Pact for the Future, Declaration on Future Generations, and Global Digital Compact — and their follow-through, the 2024 United Nations Civil Society Conference further facilitated some twenty-three ImPact Coalitions between civil society groups (including scholars and policy researchers), champion governments, UN agencies, and other partners.

Similar to the follow-through to the last comprehensive review of the multilateral system in time for the September 2005 World Summit (which led, for instance, to the creation of the Peacebuilding Architecture in December 2005, and upgrading of the Human Rights Commission into a more capable Council in March 2006, with new tools such as the Universal Periodic Review), major openings and intergovernmental vehicles for advancing near-term progress on Pact for the Future implementation include: follow-on resolutions by the General Assembly, Security Council, and Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC); the Ad-Hoc Working Group on the Revitalization of the General Assembly; the intergovernmental negotiations on Security Council Reform; and reviews of ECOSOC and the related High-Level Political Forum (HLPF). Sector-specific implementation also could be taken-up in venues such as the 2025 Peacebuilding Architecture Review; the 2025 Fourth International Conference on Financing for Development; the 2025 World Social Summit; the World Summit on the Information Society +20 review in 2025; the High-level Review of the Global Digital Compact during the General Assembly’s 2027-2028 session; the review of the Declaration on Future Generations at a high-level plenary meeting during the General Assembly’s 2028-2029 session, and other ongoing forums such as meetings of the World Bank, IMF, WTO, Climate COPs, and G20. Over the next three years (and building on this past year’s progress), each of these distinct tracks could achieve significant milestones and generate momentum toward the officially mandated, in September 2028, high-level intergovernmental review of the Pact for the Future.¹

These multiple, often concurrent official tracks would benefit from a dynamic, multistakeholder initiative that provides a steady stream of independent policy research, Track 1.5 policy dialogues, and other inputs and engagements designed to boost and facilitate efforts to reach the Summit of the Future’s (SOTF) overarching goals and concrete actions and commitments. Introduced in this brief concept note, the ***Pact Innovation Forum: Elevating SOTF Follow-through Research, Monitoring & Implementation*** is one such initiative. Anchored by diverse SOTF champion governments and the [Global Governance Innovation Network](#),² the **Pact Innovation Forum** offers a suite of practical and flexible services (e.g., quick

turn-around policy research products from leading scholars, tailor-made Track 1.5 policy dialogues, rigorous and interactive Pact for the Future implementation monitoring, and a virtual community of practice) to assist the United Nations, civil society-led ImPact Coalitions, and other partners in maximizing the Summit of the Future's outcomes, in support of meaningful change for present and future generations.

II. Goals and Service Areas of the Pact Innovation Forum

The Pact Innovation Forum brings together governments, policy research, civil society and private sector groups, and global and regional international organizations *seeking to realize the full potential of the Pact for the Future, Declaration on Future Generations, and Global Digital Compact's Actions and Sub-Actions to innovate global governance* — engendering institutional, legal, policy, operational, and normative change and strengthening across the multilateral system. Collectively, this informal, multistakeholder platform for SOTF champions **generates new thinking** (“ideate”) on the road ahead, drawing upon the creative scholarship and rigorous monitoring methodologies of think tankers and academics associated with the Global Governance Innovation Network.

The Forum's core service areas for Summit of the Future follow-through research, monitoring, and implementation include: i) **policy research** (major reports, policy briefs, and commentaries); ii) **track 1.5 global and regional policy dialogues**; iii) **monitoring of progress**, especially through a **Pact Monitoring Toolkit**; and iv) an **online community of practitioners, researchers, and advocates** that is guided by a **Pact Innovation Plan** and employs robust traditional/social media outreach and advocacy strategies. Each set of activities aims to inform and shape global public opinion on measures to improve and innovate global governance to meet current and future global challenges and opportunities.

Within these closely linked four service areas are two flagship initiatives:

A **Pact Monitoring Toolkit**: Rather than launching an entirely new monitoring mechanism, this set of tools pulls together existing indicators and other monitoring methodologies (e.g., for the Sustainable Development Goals) across the United Nations and broader multilateral system, as well as in research, private sector and civil society institutions worldwide. If critical modeling or data gaps are identified (e.g., through a comprehensive mapping exercise), the Pact Monitoring Toolkit offers a ready and recognized venue or access point for new, vetted tools or measures to fill such lacunae — including tailor-made logframe tracking tool and steps toward a searchable, online interactive portal: **Pact Monitoring Portal** (*please see accompanying Pact Monitoring Toolkit concept for details*).

A **Pact Innovation Plan**: With a focus on innovation and preserving the integrity of the Pact for the Future as a whole, this new dynamic, research-driven, and catalytic instrument — developed through wide, multistakeholder consultations and Pact Monitoring Toolkit insights and analysis — provides Member States, the UN Secretariat and agencies, and civil society (including ImPact Coalitions) a comprehensive analysis of relevant past experiences and a range of creative, forward-looking options to facilitate Pact implementation and follow-through (*please see accompanying Pact Innovation Plan concept for details*).

III. Pact Innovation Forum Modes of Operation and Partnerships

With the Global Governance Innovation Network as the host secretariat of the **Pact Innovation Forum**, participation in the forum includes a diverse, cross-regional, and manageable number of UN Member States, policy research, civil society and private sector groups, and global and regional international organizations. This involves, in particular, the leaders of multistakeholder ImPact Coalitions dedicated to

facilitating tangible (and measurable) delivery on specific major Actions and Sub-Actions presented in the Pact for the Future, Declaration on Future Generations, and Global Digital Compact. Participating members of the forum are expected to lend support to the development and execution of this informal, multistakeholder platform's activities, including the **Pact Monitoring Toolkit** and **Pact Innovation Plan**.

Joining the **Pact Innovation Forum** signifies a commitment to supporting the monitoring and follow-through of the Pact for the Future. Though participation carries no formal policy, operational, or financial obligations, it reflects a spirit of collaboration in support of Pact implementation among a group of like-minded partners, facilitated by knowledge products and dialogues of the Global Governance Innovation Network and its one hundred and thirty partner think tanks and academic institutions worldwide, as well as diverse ImPact Coalition partners supported by the Coalition for the UN We Need.

- i) Updated **Pact Innovation Forum concept**, as well as brief synthesis report, reviewed by forum partners after the 24-25 Nov. 2025 Pact Innovation Forum Pocantico Retreat (finalized by January).
- ii) Year 2 development of the **Pact Monitoring Toolkit**, incl. a new interactive online portal (Jan.-Dec.).
- iii) Global Governance Innovation Network **Policy Briefs** commissioned, especially on Pact for the Future Actions and Sub-Actions requiring immediate and deeper policy research (January-December).
- iv) Convene half-day, in-person experts level **Pact Innovation Forum** meeting in the New York area on the further development of the **Pact Innovation Plan (Ver. 2, March)**.
- v) Encourage Pact Innovation Forum members' participation in a T20 (Think Tank 20) **E-consultation on the Future of Global Governance**, including the G20, United Nations, IFIs, and WTO (March-April).
- vi) Contribute to proposed **Annual PGA Dialogues on Pact Follow-up (Mar.-July) & Ministerial (Sept)**.
- vii) Proposed **T20-Pact Innovation Forum Track 1.5 Dialogue** on the "G20 and the Future of Multilateral Institutions" in the New York Area, coinciding with the T20's Mid-Term Conference (June)
- viii) Publication of **Global Governance Innovation Report 2026**, featuring updated analysis of data from the **Pact Monitoring Toolkit** (in the form of a logical framework) and **Pact Innovation Plan** ideas (June).
- ix) **Track 1.5 Global Policy Dialogue** on "Defending Multilateralism through the Pact for the Future," held during the 39th ACUNS Annual Meeting in Lisbon (1-3 July); presentation of the **Pact Monitoring Toolkit** and **Pact Innovation Plan (Ver. 2)** as featured in **Global Governance Innovation Report 2026**.
- x) **Pact Innovation Plan (Ver. 2)** and **Pact Monitoring Toolkit presented and discussed during a high-level UNGA 2026 side event** (and proposed Ministerial Dialogue on Pact Review Framework), feeding concrete ideas on implementation, monitoring, and follow-through in the run-up to the official SOTF official review, to be held at the start of the General Assembly's eighty-third session (20-26 Sept.).
- xi) Convene proposed (third) annual **Pact Innovation Forum Pocantico Retreat** (23-24 Nov.).
- xii) **Track 1.5 Global Policy Dialogue** on "Greater Middle Eastern Perspectives on Delivering the Pact through Global-Regional Collaboration" in Doha; further development of the **Pact Innovation Plan (Ver. 2)** and Greater MENA Research Network on Regional and Global Governance Innovation (December).

VI. Theory of Change

The “theory of change” for the Pact Innovation Forum is rooted in an understanding that greater results can be achieved when: i.) individual states and non-state actors — provided with solid, evidence-based research and analysis — recognize that their individual priority issues or institutional reforms can benefit from an inclusive, broad-based (i.e., genuinely multistakeholder), and informal partners group — in sum, one that facilitates positive, multilateral system-wide changes; and ii.) momentum for reform is generated and sustained by early wins on less contested issues that lay the groundwork for progress on harder questions.

Knowledge products encouraged and amplified by the Pact Innovation Forum seek to influence the discourse and decision-making of both powerful “insiders,” including the leaders of governments and the UN Secretary-General, and prominent representatives from civil society, the media, and the business community.⁴ For effective global governance to take shape through efforts to deliver on the promise of the Summit of the Future, bringing these different communities together is critical.

Annex I: Some Guiding Questions for the Pact Innovation Forum Pocantico Retreat (24-25 November 2025 at the Pocantico Center in Tarrytown, New York)

- Building on their substantive contributions in the run-up to the September 2024 Summit of the Future, how can policy researchers and scholars worldwide continue to best support the efforts of governments and the multilateral system in delivering on the principles, Actions, and Sub-Actions adopted at the summit?
- Drawing concrete lessons from Year 1 SOTF implementation efforts, what are some of the chief recurring and anticipated new obstacles to progressing on Pact for the Future, Global Digital Compact, and Declaration on Future Generations implementation, and do policy researchers and scholars possess any unique capabilities and networks for helping governments and international organizations to overcome (or, at the very least, understand) these obstacles? How can both a Pact Monitoring Toolkit and Pact Innovation Plan assist this effort in tangible ways?
- How can the Pact Innovation Forum, as an informal, multistakeholder platform in support of SOTF follow-through research, monitoring & implementation — involving UN Mission representatives, international civil servants, private sector and development practitioners, and policy researchers, scholars, and advocates — best help in advancing concrete goals, service areas, and innovative partnerships aimed at buttressing efforts to deliver on Pact for the Future, Global Digital Compact, and Declaration on Future Generations, between now and the officially mandated, in September 2028, high-level intergovernmental review of the Pact for the Future?

Website Upgrades and Integration of the Pact Innovation Forum

Over the last year, the Global Governance Innovation Network has worked with a team of designers and web-developers at Creativano to build out website pages for the **Pact Innovation Forum**, **Pact Innovation Plan**, and **Pact Monitoring Toolkit** to amplify forum knowledge products. The **Pact Innovation Plan** page features a calendar of civil society-led events, the official UN Pact Follow-Up timeline, relevant UNGA negotiating tracks, and the throughline of themes between the SDGs, FfD4, Pact for the Future, and World Social Summit. The **Pact Monitoring Toolkit** page offers an engaging interface to better showcase monitoring efforts in real-time, featuring a Logframe tool with detailed analysis by Pact for the Future Chapter, Action, and Sub-Action.

Phase two of Pact Innovation Forum web-development, proposed for 2026, could feature a new **Pact Monitoring Portal (PMP)** tool, where UN Mission staff and officials, alongside other champions of the Pact, can quickly and easily search for real-time progress updates on specific Pact for the Future Actions and Sub-Actions and their corresponding data sources. Uniquely, the **PMP** will feature a searchable, online function where users can select specific Pact Actions and Sub-Actions and view their individual progress through carefully assigned indicators assessed against baseline data. Given the focus on progress rather than static measures, the portal will aim to include a stoplight feature, noting via green, amber, and red colors which Actions or Sub-Actions are progressing and which are potentially lagging. This tool will demonstrate through independent, authoritative, and user-friendly monitoring tangible progress in Pact for the Future implementation, coordination, and information-sharing between Member States, the UN system, and partners across civil society and the private sector. The **PMP** will also include a feature that allows engaged actors to suggest and submit data sources, relevant information, and champions of specific Actions to further progress on the Pact. Over time, this tool will support Logframe tool indicators refinement, encouraging future editions of both the Logframe and PMP to adopt more robust indicators and data sources in the lead-up to the official 2028 Pact for the Future high-level review.

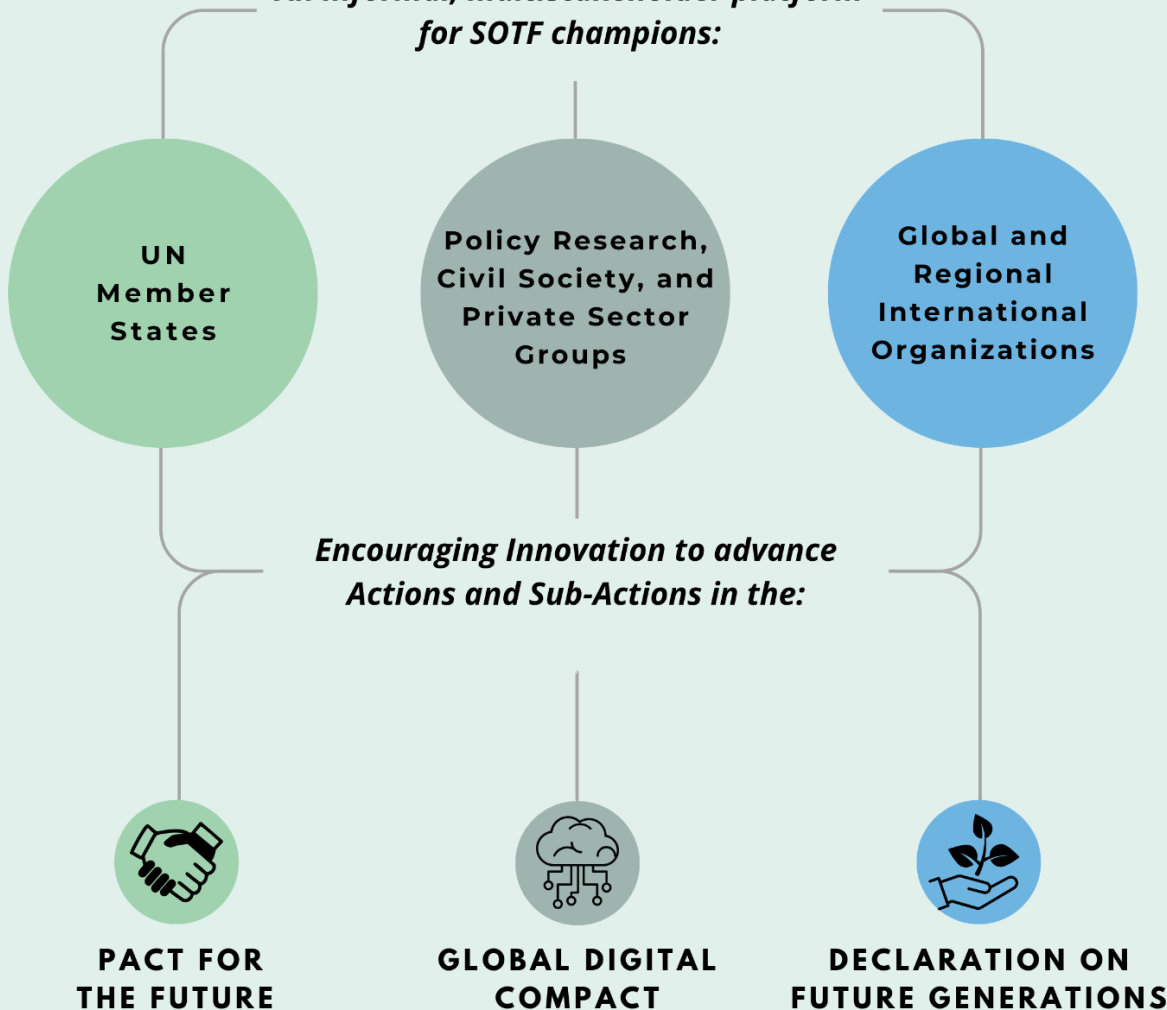

The Global Governance Innovation Network (GGIN) brings world class scholarship together with international policy-making to address fundamental global governance challenges, threats, and opportunities. Research through the network focuses on the development of institutional, policy, legal, operational, and normative improvements in the global governance architecture. GGIN is a collaborative project of the Stimson Center, Academic Council on the United Nations System (ACUNS), Plataforma CIPÓ, Leiden University, Savannah Centre for Diplomacy, Democracy & Development, Global Institute for Strategic Research, and the Council on Energy, Environment, and Water. They are joined by ninety-five Partner Institutions from around the world (comprised of interested think tanks, universities, and other non-governmental organizations, each registered as Institutional Members of the Academic Council on the UN System) engaged in UN and broader global governance scholarship and policy research.

The GGIN focuses on global governance gaps in these thematic areas and workstreams:

1. *Enhancing Global Economic & Social Governance*
2. *Rethinking the UN's Approach to Peace, Security & Humanitarian Action*
3. *Strengthening the Rule of Law, Human Rights & Inclusive Governance*

In-person, virtual, and hybrid **global and regional policy dialogues** convene public intellectuals, former statespersons, and seasoned policy-makers (e.g., UN Permanent Representatives) and practitioners (e.g., from the UN's higher echelons), alongside a new generation of analysts, policy researchers, and practitioners from the Global South and North, to address—*through academically rigorous and thematically focused Track 1.5 policy exchanges*—fundamental challenges, threats, and opportunities in both better understanding and enhancing how the world is governed.

GGIN Online Community of Practice

Through periodic **e-consultations**, a robust **social media** presence, and an interactive **online knowledge platform**, the GGIN has also forged an online community of practice. Its main aim is to facilitate a regular dialogue between scholars, policy researchers, policy-makers, and practitioners committed to understanding and addressing major gaps in global governance. These interactions are designed, in turn, to build a shared sense of community and appreciation for diverse perspectives on the future of global governance and its interplay with regional and sub-regional governance bodies.
